Mr. Dwyer stated that there is good progress in the cyber world. Mr. Oates and Ms. McCarthy have been working on cyber insurance. The is in good shape. inventory on protected sensitive inventory. The group has learned about the two reoccurring incidents. One is, an impairment. Ransomware, malware impairment. The other kind could be a disclosure. The system needs to be prepared for both.

The group has been identifying where sensitive data is, inventory, contact lists, etc. Mr. Oates in in the process of finalizing some issue with DoIt. They are working with putting together all the pieces with BRS staff and all our partners. Next month Mr. Oates will give an update with the DoIt activities.

Investment Update

2023 Search Planning

Mr. Manning stated that NEPC will review the manager searches planned for 2023, and the recommended order. The System has at least five searches to complete in 2023. Three of the searches have already been issued and are to be completed.

Mr. Fadley went on to present. He stated that NEPC has highlighted four managers in the search and updated the Board with their final closing dates.

Mr. Manning went on to state that the goal here for us is to identify two to three managers to bring in for the next meeting. We've got managers across the risk spectrum. Maranon and Kayne would be for example, on the more conservative side while a manager like Blue Torch would probably be looking at deals that are going to yield a little bit more because they've got more risk because they're more opportunistic in the way they approach direct lending. The question for the board is, how far along that spectrum would you want to consider?

The Board, BRS staff and NEPC discussed the merits, fees, strategies and performance of each of the recommended managers. The Board elected to have

Kayne Anderson, Maranon Capital and Blue Torch Capital come to the April Board meeting to present.

Small Cap Equity Search

The small cap equity search was issued in compliance with the seven-year search requirement, and included core, value, and growth strategies.

At the January meeting, we completed the value component of the search. Three value finalists presented and the Board selected Mesirow to replace Bernzott as the System's small cap value manager.

At today's meeting, we will review the core and growth candidates, alongside the respective incumbents, Aristotle and Westfield. NEPC has included an analysis for both core and growth in today's materials. The goal of today's discussion is to (1) reaffirm the Board's comfort and conviction in the current managers, or (2) select finalists to interview at an upcoming meeting.

We have three search components value, which we addressed at the last meeting where Mesirow was selected to replace Bernzott, core and growth. You'll see that the existing managers Aristotle and Westfield have performed really well. We went back to Aristotle a couple times and because of the overall relationship, they're willing to knock their management fee down by effectively 10 basis points or 15%.

The Board, BRS staff and NEPC discussed the merits, fees, strategies and performance of each of the responding and current BRS managers. After discussion, a motion was made.

Motion made, and seconded, to <u>retain</u> Aristotle Capital Boston, LLC and Westfield Capital as a part of our small cap equity search as presented.

Outstanding/Ongoing Financial Issues: Ellen M. McCarthy, Comptroller Financial Update

February 2023 Financial Snapshot

Ms. McCarthy reported the February 2023 pension payroll as follows: Contributory payroll: \$59,939,464; Contributory Payees: 15,686; Non-contributory payroll: \$310,184; Total Non-contributory payees: 31; Regular Retirees: 25; Survivor/Beneficiary Retirees: 6 Disability Retirees: 3; Option C/Disb Surv; 6; Members Refunds: 69 for \$1,239,897; Members Transfers: 8 for \$752,730; Option B Refunds: 9 for \$261,516; and Operational Warrants: \$321,834.

Ms. McCarthy stated that her and her team are working on PERAC's annual statement that is due May 1st. They are close to wrapping it up. She expects to present the statement to the Board in the April Board meeting, so it can be filed on time. PERAC is trying to do away with paper transactions. This year the Board will be signing electronically through prosper.

She also stated that the system has completed its application for cyber security and it was sent back to the systems agent on February 2, 2023. Currently, the systems policy is about to expire April 22nd.

Outstanding/Ongoing Operations Issues: Lauren Santillana, Interim Operations Officer

February 2023 payroll update

Mrs. Santillana provided an update on the payroll numbers for the month of February. 66 new retirees scheduled for the February payroll, 53 Superannuation and 10 Disability Cases and 3 pre-retirement death case. Out of the 66 cases, 54 new benefits were put on payroll from the February list plus an additional 3 that had missed prior payrolls for a total of 57 new retirees. 43 superannuation, 10 disability, 4 pre-retirement death) 12 missed the payroll, and 12, no final papers returned.

Outstanding/Ongoing Legal Issues: Natacha Thomas, General Council Legal update

Board member Michael O'Reilly asked whether there were any changes to 91A Annual Compliance and if PERAC was doing anything different because he has received numerous calls from members.

Ms. Thomas stated that BRS fell behind because of the covid-19 pandemic. BRS does not oversee 91A, we follow what PERAC directs us to do. A lot of members did not comply with the 91A Annual Compliance so PERAC directed BRS to suspend them and conduct hearings prior to terminating benefits. It was difficult to conduct hearings during the pandemic.

- O'Keefe v. Boston Retirement Board, (Superior Court Dec. 04.24.2023) The court ruled in BRS' favor. The court opined that BRS did not act improperly. Ms. Thomas states that it is unclear whether Ms. O'Keefe is going to appeal.
